Age of Enlightenment 2.0

Not only is our world interesting in the Chinese sense, but We the People of the world, like Rip van Winkle, are waking up after a long siesta. How else can you explain phenomena like: "Occupy," "Arab Spring" and "Tea Party?" Long oppressed peoples are apparently spontaneously finally rising up to express dissatisfaction with their rulers, and challenging the foreign policies of the rest of world to respond. Everybody sincerely desires Democracy", "Justice" and "Freedom." But things don't quite seem to work out.

In the 17th and 18th centuries Western cultures experienced an "Age of Enlightenment" (the "Enlightenment") or "Age of Reason." The idea was to substitute reason for the rules of tradition and faith. Our American independence was inspired by this energetic movement.

However, in the intervening 200 years, our Enlightenment has lost some of it energy. It's time to talk about it!

This year we will attempt to develop an appreciation of the progress of Western Civilization before and after the first "Enlightenment." We will try to understand why, when so much of the world has embraced the principles of the enlightenment, an equally large part of the world has not. What about this "Pursuit of happiness" thing. Are we really free to pursue our happiness, whatever that might be? Or, are there conscious or unconscious forces at work that down deep inside sincerely feel they can and should be keeping our society and economy on the right track? When a society is put under continued real or perceived stress it begins to feel insecure and that can make it receptive to ideas that are not necessarily helpful to bringing about a free and peaceful world.

The **Age of Enlightenment** (or simply the **Enlightenment** or **Age of Reason**)

...was a <u>cultural movement</u> of <u>intellectuals</u> beginning in the late 17th and 18th century Europe emphasizing reason and individualism rather than tradition. Its purpose was to reform society using reason, challenge ideas grounded in tradition and faith, and advance knowledge through the scientific method. It promoted scientific thought, skepticism and intellectual interchange. [2] It opposed superstition and intolerance, with the Catholic church a favorite target. Some Enlightenment philosophes collaborated with Enlightened despots, who were absolute rulers who tried out some of the new governmental ideas in practice. The ideas of the Enlightenment have had a long-term major impact on the culture, politics, and governments of the Western world.



The Enlightenment

Originating about 1650 to 1700, it was sparked by philosophers Baruch Spinoza (1632–1677), John Locke (1632–1704), Pierre Bayle (1647–1706), Voltaire (1694–1778) and physicist Isaac Newton (1643–1727).[3] Ruling princes often endorsed and fostered these figures and even attempted to apply their ideas of government in what was known as enlightened absolutism. The Scientific Revolution is closely tied to the Enlightenment, as its discoveries overturned many traditional concepts and introduced new perspectives on nature and man's place within it. The Enlightenment flourished until about 1790–1800, after which the emphasis on reason gave way to Romanticism's emphasis on emotion, and a Counter-Enlightenment gained force.[4]

In France, Enlightenment was based in the <u>salons</u> and culminated in the great <u>Encyclopédie</u> (1751–72) edited by <u>Denis Diderot</u> (1713– 1784) and (until 1759) Jean le Rond d'Alembert (1717–1783) with contributions by hundreds of leading *philosophes* (intellectuals) such as <u>Voltaire</u> (1694–1778), <u>Rousseau</u> (1712–1778) [5] and <u>Montesquieu</u> (1689–1755). Some 25,000 copies of the 35 volume set were sold, half of them outside France. The new intellectual forces spread to urban centres across Europe, notably England, Scotland, the German states, the Netherlands, Poland, Russia, Italy, Austria, and Spain, then jumped the Atlantic into the European colonies, where it influenced Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson, among many others, and played a major role in the American Revolution. The political ideals of the Enlightenment influenced the American <u>Declaration of Independence</u>, the <u>United States Bill of Rights</u>, the French Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen, and the Polish–Lithuanian Constitution of May 3, 1791. <u>Italian Renaissance</u> – The Italian Renaissance was the earliest manifestation of the general European Renaissance, a period of great cultural change and achievement that began in Italy around the end of the 13th century and lasted until the 16th century, marking the transition between Medieval and Early Modern Europe.

The reformation: 1500–1650

Main article: Protestant Reformation

<u>Protestantism</u>— a denomination of <u>Christianity</u> formed by <u>Martin</u> <u>Luther</u>, which split from <u>Catholicism</u> in the early 16th Century, causing much conflict and strife.

<u>Reformation</u>— a term referring to the process by which <u>Protestantism</u> emerged and gained supporters.

<u>Counter Reformation</u>— the backlash to the <u>Reformation</u> by <u>Catholicism</u>, resulting in a great deal of fighting, most notably the <u>30</u> Years War.

<u>30 Years War</u>— a conflict fought mainly in the <u>Germanic States</u> involving virtually all countries in <u>Europe</u>, fought over religious preeminence.

Rise of Western empires: 1500–1800

Age of Discovery – The Age of Discovery, also known as the Age of Exploration and the Great Navigations, was a period in history starting in the early 15th century and continuing into the early 17th century during which Europeans engaged in intensive exploration of the world, establishing direct contact with Africa, the Americas, Asia and Oceania and mapping the planet. [64][65][66]

<u>Colonial empire</u> – The Colonial empires were a product of the European Age of Exploration that began with a race of exploration between the then most advanced maritime powers, Portugal and Spain, in the 15th century.

<u>Mercantilism</u> – Mercantilism is the economic doctrine in which government control of foreign trade is of paramount importance for ensuring the prosperity and military security of the state. [67]

Enlightenment

<u>Divine right of kings</u> – The divine right of kings, or divine-right theory of kingship, is a political and religious doctrine of royal and political legitimacy. <u>Age of Enlightenment</u> – The period during which superstitions were rejected in favor of <u>science</u> and <u>logic</u>, typically thought of as the dawn of modern science.

Revolution: 1770–1815

<u>United States Declaration of Independence</u> – The Declaration of Independence was a statement adopted by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776, which announced that the thirteen American colonies, then at war with Great Britain, regarded themselves as independent states, and no longer a part of the British Empire. [68]

American Revolution – The American Revolution was the political upheaval during the last half of the 18th century in which Thirteen Colonies|thirteen colonies in North America joined together to break free from the British Empire, combining to become the United States|United States of America.



Mary Wollstonecraft – Mary Wollstonecraft was an 18th-century British writer, philosopher, and advocate of women's rights.



Gross World Product (GWP)




Historical and prehistorical estimates [edit source | edit beta]






Figure 2. Fifteen Largest Ancestries: 2000

Israel argues that until the 1650s Western civilization "was based on a largely shared core of faith, tradition and authority". [13]

"For Kant, Enlightenment was **mankind's final coming of age**, the **emancipation of the human consciousness** from an immature state of ignorance." In his famous essay "What is Enlightenment?" (1784), Immanuel Kant described it simply **as freedom to use one's own intelligence**. More broadly, the Enlightenment period is marked by increasing empiricism, scientific rigor, and reductionism, along with increasing questioning of religious orthodoxy.

According to <u>Bertrand Russell</u>, however, the enlightenment was **a phase in a progressive development**, which began in antiquity, and that reason and challenges to the established order were constant ideals throughout that time. [9]

Outram notes, the Enlightenment comprised " [55] many different paths, varying in time and geography, to the common goals of progress, of tolerance, and the removal of abuses in Church and state."

Characteristics of an Enlightenment – Cont.

This period saw the shaping of **two distinct lines of enlightenment thought**: [15][16]

Firstly the *radical enlightenment*, largely inspired by the one-substance philosophy of <u>Spinoza</u>, which in its political form adhered to: "democracy; racial and sexual equality; individual liberty of lifestyle; full freedom of thought, expression, and the press; eradication of religious authority from the legislative process and education; and full separation of church and state"

Secondly the *moderate enlightenment*, which in a number of different philosophical systems, like those in the writings of <u>Descartes</u>, <u>John Locke</u>, <u>Isaac Newton</u> or <u>Christian Wolff</u>, expressed some support for critical review and renewal of the old modes of thought, **but in other parts sought reform and accommodation with the old systems of power and faith**. These two lines of thought were again met by the conservative Counter-Enlightenment, encompassing those thinkers who held on to the traditional belief-based systems of thought.

Power Corrupts

"Power tends to corrupt, and absolute power corrupts absolutely. Great men are almost always bad men."

John Emerich Edward Dalberg Acton, first Baron Acton (1834–1902). The historian and moralist, who was otherwise known simply as Lord Acton, expressed this opinion in a letter to Bishop Mandell Creighton in 1887.



Basic Wilderness Survival Skills From: British Columbia Outdoor Wilderness Guide

Fear - For anyone faced with a wilderness emergency survival situation, fear is a normal reaction. Unless an emergency situation has been anticipated, fear is generally followed by panic then pain, cold, thirst, hunger, fatigue, boredom and loneliness. It is extremely important to calmly assess the situation and not allow these seven enemies to interfere with your survival.

Pain - Pain may often be ignored in a panic situation. Remember to deal with injuries immediately before they become even more serious.

Cold - Cold lowers the ability to think, numbing the body and reducing the will to survive. Never allow yourself to stop moving or to fall asleep unless adequately sheltered.


Thirst - Dehydration is a common enemy in an emergency situation and must not be ignored. It can dull your mind, causing you to overlook important survival information.

Hunger - Hunger is dangerous but seldom deadly. It may reduce your ability to think logically and increase your susceptibility to the effects of cold, pain and fear.

Fatigue - Fatigue is unavoidable in any situation so it is best to keep in mind that it can and will lower your mental ability. Remember that in an emergency situation this is often the bodies way of escaping a difficult situation.

Boredom & Loneliness - These enemies are quite often unanticipated and may lower mind's ability to deal with the situation.

The Mentality Revolution

An ever-consuming and ever-moving population — with access to more resources and information than ever before — has also undergone a massive cognitive and emotional transformation. The World Values Survey, for instance, has identified an increasing global consensus regarding the importance of individual freedoms and gender equality, as well as popular intolerance for authoritarianism. Dissatisfaction with political systems and government institutions is also a growing and global phenomenon.


Together, these three revolutions are eroding the barriers that have shielded the powerful from challengers. The More Revolution helps the challengers overwhelm the barriers, the Mobility Revolution helps them circumvent them, and the Mentality Revolution helps them undermine them.

decline of traditional power

Should we embrace this decline of traditional power? In some ways, yes — it has given us freer societies, more elections and options for voters, new ways of becoming politically active, more investment and trade, and more choices for consumers.

But the decay of power also poses dangers to our wallets, families and lives. It explains why the U.S. economy is at the mercy of self-inflicted crises in Washington. It explains why European nations struggle to act together in the face of crippling economic problems, despite spending decades developing institutions geared toward collective action. It explains why fragile states that have difficulty delivering basic services are proliferating. It explains why the world is paralyzed in the effort to curb greenhouse gas emissions.

Realistically

It never seems to enter their minds that they may be killing the golden goose.

New Exemptions

The Act under section 11 lists out programs and activities exempt from PAYGO rules. More unconventional leaders of democracy, people like Nelson Mandela in South Africa and Myanmar's Aung San Suu Kyi, made headway because they were able to mobilize the energies, hopes, desperation and political power that were against the more dominant structures of power -- South Africa's apartheid and Myanmar's military junta

China offers another complicated picture. It has succeeded in lifting hundreds of millions of people out of poverty, he continued, but now has an emerging middle class that is placing strains and demands on the government that "are in many ways undermining its ability to be that superpower that people fear."

In 2009, during <u>his first address</u> before a joint session of Congress, President Obama championed a budget that (**he thought**) would serve as a blueprint for the country's future through ambitious investments in energy, health care and education. "This is America," the new president proclaimed. "We don't do what's easy."

Four years later, even easy seems impossible. "Let's agree right here, right now, to keep the people's government open, pay our bills on time and always uphold the full faith and credit of the United States of America," Obama pleaded during his State of the Union address.

By having to exhort Congress to execute even the most basic functions of government, Obama — fresh off <u>the "fiscal cliff" fight</u> and facing yet another showdown with lawmakers over <u>massive automatic spending</u> <u>cuts</u> — revealed just how limited the powers of the highest office in the land have become.

The Mobility Revolution



Whatever happened to that "dominion" over the Earth people are supposed have?


Did we lose that when Adam and Eve got kicked out of the Garden of Eden?

The long term ice core record: the last 800,000 years


Even longer term records exist for few sites: the recent Antarctic EPICA core reaches 800 kyr; many others reach more than 100,000 years. The EPICA core covers eight glacial/interglacial cycles. The NGRIP core from Greenland stretchs back more than 100 kyr, with 5 kyr in the Eemian interglacial. Whilst the large-scale signals from the cores are clear, there are problems interpreting the detail, and connecting the isotopic variation to the temperature signal.

On longer time scales, sediment cores show that the cycles of glacials and interglacials are part of a deepening phase within a prolonged ice age that began with the glaciation of Antarctica approximately 40 million years ago. This deepening phase, and the accompanying cycles, largely began approximately 3 million years ago with the growth of continental ice sheets in the Northern Hemisphere. Gradual changes in Earth's climate of this kind have been frequent during the Earth's 4500 million year existence and most often are attributed to changes in the configuration of continents and ocean sea ways.
