Rest assured that we are engaged in no illegal activity, but we are aware of, value and have faith in our Constitutional rights.



Cabinet Choices Seen as Move for More Harmony and Control

ASHINGTON, Nov. 16 - <u>President Bush</u> has instructed his new national security team to end the running battles between the State and Defense departments and the Central Intelligence Agency, and intends to extend his personal control over agencies he has suspected of impeding his foreign policy aims, according to current and former administration officials.

One senior official said Mr. Bush decided months ago to make no effort to retain Secretary of State Colin L. Powell, who had long indicated he planned to leave.

New C.I.A. Chief Tells Workers to Back Administration Policies

ASHINGTON, Nov. 16 - Porter J. Goss, the new intelligence chief, has told Central Intelligence Agency employees that their job is to "support the administration and its policies in our work," a copy of an internal memorandum shows.

"As agency employees we do not identify with, support or champion opposition to the administration or its policies," Mr. Goss said in the memorandum, which was circulated late on Monday. He said in the document that he was seeking "to clarify beyond doubt the rules of the road."

While his words could be construed as urging analysts to conform with administration policies, Mr. Goss also wrote, "We provide the intelligence as we see it - and let the facts alone speak to the policymaker."

Guatemalan workers seeking refuge

As lawsuits over wages languish in court, peasants look for a better life in Mexico

EL TUMBADOR, GUATEMALA - While tens of thousands of peasants fled to Mexico to escape the crossfire of Guatemala's civil war, Roberto Morales stayed, picking coffee on the farm where he had lived and worked his whole life.

But now, eight years after leftist rebels and the army signed a peace accord, Morales and nearly 200 other workers from six coffee farms in Guatemala's western province of San Marcos are seeking refuge and a better life in Mexico.

These farm workers, who shocked the nation late last month with their announcement, say plantation owners owe them nearly \$1 million in unpaid wages and severance pay. The lawsuits they have filed against their former employers have languished in the courts, some for nearly four years. The peasants say they have had enough with a country that does not treat them like citizens.

"The people are getting desperate. There is law here, but there is no justice," Morales said.

Says DeLay, suddenly putting much stock in the opinion of the ethics committee:

I understand the Democrat Party's adjustment to their national minority status is frustrating, but their crushing defeat in the elections earlier this month, after two more years of Democrat obstruction and vicious personal attacks, should show them that the American people are tired of the politics of personal destruction.

Protecting Tom DeLay

Knight Ridder/Tribune News Service (KRT) - The following editorial appeared in the Chicago Tribune on Thursday, Nov. 18:

In the last few months, the Republican-led House Ethics Committee has rebuked House Majority Leader Tom DeLay three times for his unethical conduct. Three of DeLay's political associates have been indicted in a Texas grand jury investigation of corruption, and there's speculation he could be indicted. DeLay's own constituents seem to be growing suspicious about the controversial remap of Texas House districts he engineered; they re-elected him on Nov. 2, but with the narrowest margin he has enjoyed in years.

You'd think all that would be making Republicans nervous about whether the man known as "The Hammer" was fixing to turn his own party into the nail. Ethics scandals have a bad habit of sticking around, as the Illinois Republican Party can attest.

So what did Republicans do? On Wednesday, the House GOP moved to protect the man who seems to be leading them into a major embarrassment. The Republicans voted to change party rules so DeLay can keep his leadership job if he is indicted by the Texas grand jury.

Reuters Stocks Fall, Jolted by Oil and Greenspan

NEW YORK (Reuters) - U.S. stocks tumbled on Friday as investors were jolted by a surge in oil prices and comments by Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan, who gave a stark reminder that interest rates were bound to go higher and warned that appetite for the dollar would dwindle. Crude oil reversed some its recent slide and leapt on jitters over fuel supplies, with NYMEX December crude (CLZ4) ending up \$2.22 at \$48.44 a barrel.

High oil prices hurt stocks because of their impact on profits and consumer spending. Shares of industrial stocks fell with Caterpillar Inc. (NYSE:<u>CAT</u> - <u>News</u>) down \$1.26 at \$90.18. But oil companies gained, with Dow component Exxon Mobil Corp. (NYSE:<u>XOM</u> - <u>News</u>) up 33 cents at \$50.38.



"You have been given a mandate. ... Put your agenda on the front burner and let it boil. You owe the liberals nothing. They despise you because they despise your Christ," said the letter, dated Nov. 3.

Four More Years By James Mann, November 2004

President Bush's neoconservative "Vulcans" are back for a second term in office. But this time, they will discover they have limited resources and diminished credibility

The **Doomsayers** suggest that Bush's second term is likely to **produce further military interventions overseas**, along the lines of Iraq in 2003. Perhaps Syria may be the next target of U.S. military power, they suggest, or Iran. They believe that the neoconservatives (that is, officials such as Deputy Secretary of Defense Paul Wolfowitz), who were the driving force behind the Bush administration's preventive war against Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein, will have even greater power and influence, now that the president has won reelection. "Secretary of State Colin Powell is not staying for a second term," warned one Foreign Service officer, writing under the byline "Anonymous" on Salon.com last month. "When he goes the last bulwark against complete neoconservative control of U.S. foreign policy goes with him."

The **Skeptics** contend that Bush's foreign policy in his **second term will turn out to be more cautious and less belligerent** than his first, if not by choice, then by compulsion. Whatever some hawks might like to do, the reality is that the Bush **administration will face a series of constraints—military, diplomatic, political, and economic**—that will curb its ability to launch new preventive wars. Moreover, say adherents of the Skeptic school, the power of the neoconservatives inside the administration will probably be diminished, not augmented, during Bush's second term.

How did this come to pass? We live in an economy that has become deeply dependent on the American consumer for growth. U.S. consumer spending accounts for around 70 percent of U.S. gross domestic product. So nobody wants to see the consumer falter, and they have been doing their darndest to make sure that doesn't happen.

The Federal Reserve has cut rates like never before, allowing mortgage rates to come down this year to their lowest recorded levels. Car companies have offered zero percent financing for two years now, and they've recently begun offering it on 2004 vehicles.

But rather than using such rate reductions as an opportunity to save money, consumers have, as a whole, used them as an opportunity to spend more.


EATING THE HOUSE



NEW YORK (CNN/Money) - For most Americans, a record low for the dollar doesn't have the same urgency as soaring oil prices or a big tumble in the stock market.

But the dollar is important to economists and policy-makers.

Fed Chairman Alan Greenspan, for example, <u>warned</u> in a speech in Europe Friday that two of the things weakening the dollar -- the trade deficit and the budget deficit -- should not be allowed to fester too long. But even the Fed has relatively few tools at its disposal to address either deficit directly.

Possible mad cow case shocks cattle industry
The animal is not in the food supply, and the test results may take a week

Federal officials Thursday announced the possible discovery of a case of mad cow disease, which sent a shock through the cattle business even before a final result was in.

U.S. Agriculture Department officials offered no details about where or how this animal was singled out, but it did say it was spotted before slaughter so it won't get into the food supply. The carcasses of animals that are tested are held until the final results come in.

"Inconclusive results are a normal component of screening tests, which are designed to be extremely sensitive so they will detect any sample that could possibly be positive," said Andrea Morgan, an associate deputy administrator for the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, in a written statement.

The sample was sent to the National Veterinary Services Laboratory in Ames, Iowa, where it could take four to seven days to analyze. But the manufacturer of the screening test, Bio-Rad, told Reuters that the sample was screened twice, which makes it far more likely to be positive.



Do you like <u>fast-forwarding through commercials</u> on a television program you've recorded? How much do you like it? Because language that makes fast-forwarding through commercials illegal—no doubt inserted at the behest of lobbyists for the advertising industry—was inserted into a bill that would allow people to fast forward past objectionable sections of a recorded movie (and I bet you already thought that was OK). And that's but one, albeit scary, scenario that may come to pass if the Intellectual Property Protection Act is enacted into law. Deliberations on this legislation will be one of the tasks for the lame-duck Congress that

Senate Backs Higher Debt

ASHINGTON, Nov. 17 - Faced with the prospect of a government unable to pay its bills, the Senate voted on Wednesday to raise the federal debt limit by \$800 billion.

Though an increase in the debt ceiling was never in doubt, Republican leaders in both houses of Congress postponed action on it last month, until after the elections, to deprive Democrats of a chance to accuse them of fiscal irresponsibility.

The bill, if approved by the House in a vote expected on Thursday, would authorize the third big increase in the federal borrowing since President Bush took office in 2001. Federal debt has ballooned by \$1.4 trillion over the past four years, to \$7.4 trillion, and the new ceiling would allow borrowing to reach \$8.2 trillion.

With no end in sight to the huge annual budget deficits, which hit a record of \$412 billion this year, lawmakers predicted on Wednesday that the new ceiling would probably have to be raised again in about a year.

Democrats, still stinging from their election defeats, voted against the measure and argued that it should be accompanied by rules that would force Congress to pay for new tax cuts with spending cuts or tax increases elsewhere.

"I don't remember anyone during the elections making a promise to raise the federal debt to \$8.1 trillion," Senator Kent Conrad, Democrat of North Dakota, said. "What we're doing here is just writing another blank check and saying to this administration, 'Go ahead, continue to run record budget deficits.'"

OIL AND GAS LIQUIDS 2004 Scenario


