

From left: Prince Henrik, Crown Princess Mary, Prince Frederick and Queen Margrethe wave to the crowd.


Electoral votes tied, polls show

FDA move on Plan B stirs furor

WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration acknowledged Friday that it rejected over-the-counter sale of the emergency contraceptive Plan B after its own staff — as well as two expert advisory panels — recommended that it be approved.

But officials denied charges Friday that the decision had been made to satisfy the political wishes of social conservatives, who lobbied President Bush by saying that increased accessibility to emergency contraception would lead to greater teen promiscuity.

Speaking in a teleconference Friday morning, Steven Galson, acting director of the Center for Drug Evaluation and Research, said that he made the decision in consultation with the FDA commissioner's office, but without any other outside input.

"The decision I made had to do with looking at all the data and reading all the transcripts," Galson. He said he was especially concerned about the lack

of information in the application about "the younger age group between 11 and 14, where we know there is a substantial amount of sexual activity."

The decision was an unusual repudiation of the lopsided recommendation of the agency's own expert advisory panel, which voted 23-4 late last year that the drug should be sold over the counter and then, that same day, 27-0 that the drug could be safely sold as an over-the-counter medication. FDA observers said it was extremely uncommon, if not unprec-

edented, for the agency to overrule both its own reviewers and an expert panel in making a decision.


The campaign of Democratic presidential candidate John Kerry, D-Mass., quickly attacked the decision.

"The White House is once again choosing ideology over science," Kerry said in a statement.

In a letter to Barr Laboratories, the agency said Thursday that the application was denied because only 29 of the 585 women studied by the company were younger than 16 — a sample that was too small to assess safety.

The agency held out the possibility of a future approval if the company could prove the drug is safe for young girls or devise a plan that would keep Plan B on by-prescription-only status for girls younger than 16. In its letter, the FDA said keeping the drug prescription-only for adolescents had been discussed with the company.

"Clearly we're disappointed," said Barr CEO Bruce Downey, who had told investors last week that he expected an "approvable" letter from the FDA.

PROHIBITION AGAINST USE OF FORCE

The use of force, mental torture, threats, insults, or exposure to unpleasant and inhumane treatment of any kind is prohibited by law and is neither authorized nor condoned by the US Government. Experience indicates that the use of force is not necessary to gain the cooperation of sources for interrogation. Therefore, the use of force is a poor technique, as it yields unreliable results, may damage subsequent collection efforts, and can induce the source to say whatever he thinks the interrogator wants to hear. However, the use of force is not to be confused with psychological ploys, verbal trickery, or other nonviolent and noncoercive ruses used by the interrogator in questioning hesitant or uncooperative sources.

PROHIBITION AGAINST USE OF FORCE (Cont)

The psychological techniques and principles outlined should neither be confused with, nor construed to be synonymous with, unauthorized techniques such as brainwashing, mental torture, or any other form of mental coercion to include drugs. These techniques and principles are intended to serve as guides in obtaining the willing cooperation of a source. The absence of threats in interrogation is intentional, as their enforcement and use normally constitute violations of international law and may result in prosecution under the UCMJ.

Additionally, the inability to carry out a threat of violence or force renders an interrogator ineffective should the source challenge the threat. Consequently, from both legal and moral viewpoints, the restrictions established by international law, agreements, and customs render threats of force, violence, and deprivation useless as interrogation techniques.

Who is capable of torture? ...

In 1971, researchers at Stanford University created a simulated prison in the basement of the campus psychology building. They randomly assigned 24 students to be either prison guards or prisoners for two weeks. Within days, the "guards" had become swaggering and sadistic, to the point of placing bags over the prisoners' heads, forcing them to strip naked and encouraging them to perform sexual acts.

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Dr Philip G Zimbardo, a leader of the Stanford prison study, said that while the rest of the world was shocked by the images from Iraq, "I was not surprised that it happened. I have exact, parallel pictures of prisoners with bags over their heads" from the 1971 study, he said.

Prison Torture Begins at Home

Even the dissemination of the torture photos on CD is a modern twist on a deep American tradition. In the 19th and 20th centuries, Americans used to mail postcards of lynchings to family and friends, with remarks scribbled on the back like, "Look what we did last Sunday afternoon. We got things under control down here." In the picture you'd see a mob surrounding the body of a beaten black man hanging from a tree, his pants pulled down to his ankles as a final indignity.

You might wonder, who were those people? I submit they were everyday Americans.

The other day I waited with my banker while a machine took a long time to spit out a new ATM PIN number. We started talking. After a few minutes he mentioned that his son-in-law, who works at a prison, told him, "Thank god for steel toe boots, because they really make the prisoners jump." My banker

morbidly chuckled. He didn't know that I have been kicked by guards with their steel toe boots, and that I didn't jump so much as wince and curl up into a ball on the floor.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service estimates that not only do 400,000 torture victims live in the United States, but between 800 to 1000 of their torturers do, as well.

BUSH PROPOSES TO OUTSOURCE US MILITARY

WASHINGTON: Frustrated by the lack of progress in Iraq, US President George W. Bush proposed today to outsource the US military presence in Iraq.

"Outsourcing is ultimately very good for our economy," Bush said in a press conference in front of the Indian Embassy.

"If other people can do the job cheaper and better than we can, then we can sit back in the lap of luxury and let the others sweat," Bush said.

The US military outsourcing plan vaguely resembles original proposals to install a UN peace-keeping force in Iraq.

"We are not suggesting there is any role for international organizations like the United Nations," Bush said. "Instead, we are going to deploy forces from other countries on a business-like basis."

The outsourcing plan, developed by Halliburton, involves hiring the militaries of several Middle Eastern and South Asian countries. Troops from India, Pakistan, Turkey and Egypt will be hired and stationed in Iraq.

US troops would be removed from Iraq no later than July 4th to allow for large homecoming parades and Bush For President campaign events.

The Midas Touch (From http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Midas) With Interpretive Annotations

Midas was a character in Greek mythology, who is most recognized for his ability to turn anything he touched into gold. He was King of Phrygia in Asia Minor in the 8th century BC. As a child, he was adopted by Gordias and Cybele. He was known for being a hedonist, and an excellent rose gardener. [*Unusual origin*]

Midas was taken by the people and made king, in obedience to the command of the oracle, which had said that their future king should come in a wagon. While the people were deliberating, Gordius with his wife and son came driving his wagon into the public square. [*The comission by the mystic*]

Dionysus (Greek god of fertility, ritual dance, and mysticism) found his old school master and foster father, Silenus, missing. McNamara's 11 lessons

In 1995, former U.S. Secretary of Defense Robert McNamara published In Retrospect, the first of his three books dissecting the errors, myths and miscalculations that led to the Vietnam War, which he now believes was a serious mistake. Nine years later, most of these lessons seem uncannily relevant to the Iraq war in its current nation-building, guerrilla-warfare phase.

?We misjudged then -- and we have since -- the geopolitical intentions of our adversaries . . . and we exaggerated the dangers to the United States of their actions.

?We viewed the people and leaders of South Vietnam in terms of our own experience. . . . We totally misjudged the political forces within the country.

?We underestimated the power of nationalism to motivate a people to fight and die for their beliefs and values.

?Our judgments of friend and foe alike reflected our profound ignorance of the history, culture, and politics of the people in the area, and the personalities and habits of their leaders.

?We failed then -- and have since -- to recognize the limitations of modern, high-technology military equipment, forces and doctrine. . . . We failed as well to adapt our military tactics to the task of winning the hearts and minds of people from a totally different culture.

?We failed to draw Congress and the American people into a full and frank discussion and debate of the pros and cons of a large-scale military involvement . . . before we initiated the action.

?After the action got under way and unanticipated events forced us off our planned course . . . we did not fully explain what was happening and why we were doing what we did.

?We did not recognize that neither our people nor our leaders are omniscient. Our judgment of what is in another people's or country's best interest should be put to the test of open discussion in international forums. We do not have the God-given right to shape every nation in our image or as we choose.

?We did not hold to the principle that U.S. military action . . . should be carried out only in conjunction with multinational forces supported fully (and not merely cosmetically) by the international community.

?We failed to recognize that in international affairs, as in other aspects of life, there may be problems for which there are no immediate solutions. . . . At times, we may have to live with an imperfect, untidy world.

?Underlying many of these errors lay our failure to organize the top echelons of the executive branch to deal effectively with the extraordinarily complex range of political and military issues.

[In Robert McNamara's #1 bestseller *In Retrospect*, he] writes, "We of the Kennedy and Johnson administrations who participated in the decisions on Vietnam acted according to what we thought were the principles and traditions of this nation. We made our decisions in light of those values. Yet **we were wrong, terribly wrong**. We owe it to future generations to explain why. I truly believe that we made an error not of values and intentions, but of judgment and capabilities."

What is it that keeps us from learning from history?

There is certainly plenty to learn from.

Are we destined or doomed to a new war every 20 - 25 years because thats how humans are?

Perhaps winning is not really that important, perhaps it is the action that we crave.

Schwarzkopf, who says he's had no official dialogue with U.S. government or military officials since the war started in Afghanistan, cautions against hawks calling for the United States to take the war on terrorism to Iraq.

"These Arab countries are supporting us and they're part of the coalition. We don't want to lose them by capriciously attacking Iraq," he said. "But if I was Saddam, I'd be very careful about leaving a smoking gun around."

Schwarzkopf also criticized arm-chair generals and hard-liners who are screaming about expanding the war beyond Afghanistan.

"That totally disregards the sensitivities of that part of the world. It's a very, very complicated part of the world. It's not that simple.

"The interesting thing is that the ones that are saying we should go after Saddam are not the ones who would have to get shot at.

They're not the ones that are going to be killed and they're not the ones that are going to be leaving behind their families."

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He's had time to think. He likes the performance of Colin Powell -- chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff during the Gulf War, now secretary of state. "He's doing a wonderful job, I think," he says. But he is less impressed by Rumsfeld, whose briefings he has watched on television.

"Candidly, I have gotten somewhat nervous at some of the pronouncements Rumsfeld has made," says Schwarzkopf.

He contrasts Cheney's low profile as defense secretary during the Gulf War with Rumsfeld's frequent television appearances since Sept. 11, 2001. "He almost sometimes seems to be enjoying it." That, Schwarzkopf admonishes, is a sensation to be avoided when engaged in war.

Need an Authority?

What would Hillel the Elder say? What would Jesus say? What would Mohammed say? What would the Buddha say? What do you say? Will the beserkers prevail anyway?

For starters, Hillel's best known sayings are:

* "If I am not for myself, then who will be for me? And if I am only for myself, then what am I? And if not now, when?" (Pirkei Avot)

and

* "That which is hateful to you, do not do to your neighbor. That is the whole Torah; the rest is commentary. Go and study it." (Rabbi Shammai)

Malthus argued that the standard of living of the masses cannot be improved because "The power of population is indefinitely greater than the power of the earth to produce subsistence for man." Population, he asserted, when unchecked by war, famine, or disease, would increase by a geometric ratio but subsistence only by an arithmetic one. Malthus's identification of population growth as an obstacle to human progress was bitterly resisted in the Enlightenment climate of the day, and his theories--which greatly influenced classical economists like his friend David Ricardo--were interpreted as opposing social reform. In 1803, Malthus published a revised edition of his work, in which he added "moral restraint"--late marriage and abstinence--as a factor that might limit population growth, and he provided empirical evidence to back up his theories

Big Business is in charge

Getting elected is no longer just an opportunity to serve. It is a chance to become a cog in the mechanism of power.

- Discourage them from exercising their own judgement, educations and knowledge. Especially when promises and programs fail. Remind them that they must trust the leaders.
- Never answer a question directly. Ignore it if you have to.
- Ethics and Morals apply only to the common people.
- Keep the press under control by controlling access to newsmakers. Even if journalists and academics critize the actions and policies or the leaders, the Leaders have found they can just ignore them because the have tried it and it works. But look out for tipping points. (Abu Ghraib is a tipping point)
- The more obvious something is, the easier it is to get away with it. E.g. The Ex CEO of Haliburton is the Vice President. Haliburton is the prime contractor for military support in Iraq and around the world. Conflict of interest? Nah. The people are docile.

The FBI's petition, filed March 10, 2004, asked the FCC to declare that providers of broadband access and "Voice over IP" (or Voice on the Net) services are covered by the Communications Assistance for Law Enforcement Act (CALEA). The FBI also asked the FCC to create a regulatory process under which new communications protocols, applications, or services must be reviewed and approved by the FBI and FCC before they can be deployed.

The premise is that culturally and economically, America is regressing to a new age similar to the Gilded Age of the late 1800's.
