

**OPEC: Demand for crude will drop in 2007** Oil cartel says demand for its crude should slip by 800,000 barrels per day next year, cites expected jump in non-OPEC supply.September 15 2006: 12:55 PM EDT

LONDON (Reuters) -- The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries on Friday lowered a forecast for demand for its oil next year, when supply from rival producers is expected to surge.

Demand for OPEC crude, known as the call on OPEC, in 2007 will average 28.1 million barrels per day, 200,000 bpd less than forecast in August, the 11-nation producer group said in its September monthly report.

The outlook follows OPEC's decision this week to keep its oil output near a 25-year high despite a roughly \$15 drop in prices since mid-July. But the group left the door open to a supply cut before the end of the year.

In its communiqué after the group's oil ministers met in Vienna on Monday, OPEC said non-OPEC supply in 2007 would rise at the fastest rate in more than two decades. OPEC pumps more than a third of the world's oil.

"The rebound in non-OPEC supply in 2007 is predicted to be at its highest level since 1984 - and market fundamentals indicate a clear imbalance between supply and demand," OPEC said in the communiqué.

Average demand for OPEC's oil next year will be 800,000 bpd less than the 28.9 million bpd expected in 2006, the report said.

While OPEC expects supply from outside producers to rise by 1.8 million bpd next year, analysts said that the chance it may underperform could increase the burden on OPEC.

#### \$70-a-barrel oil still forecast

NEW YORK (CNNMoney.com) -- Despite a drop of over \$10 in the price of oil over the last few weeks to around \$65 dollars a barrel, the government predicts crude will still average near \$70 for the rest of 2006, according to a report released Tuesday.

In its monthly short-term energy outlook, the Energy Information Administration said 2006 and 2007 spot crude oil prices will average near \$70 a barrel.

EIA expects gasoline prices, which it said fell to \$2.62 a gallon Monday from a near-record high of \$3.04 a gallon on Aug. 7, to average \$2.55 a gallon by January before climbing again next spring.

EIA's bullish price view is based on two things: Rising demand with only a limited increase in supply.

The agency said worldwide petroleum consumption should grow by about 1.2 million barrels a day in 2006 and 1.7 million barrels a day in 2007. In 2005 the world used about 84 million barrels of oil a day.

High prices did cause EIA to reduce the amount it though consumption would grow by 100,000 barrels a day each year from last month's estimates.

EIA said oil production capacity will increase only slightly in 2007, all of which will come from Saudi Arabia.

# Report: Chevron may avoid \$1B in paymentsIncomplete lease agreements could allow oil giant to avoid paying royalties to federal government on new oil field, newspaper says.

NEW YORK (Reuters) -- A group of oil companies led by Chevron Corp. that last week announced the discovery of a huge oil field in the Gulf of Mexico could avoid more than \$1 billion in royalty payments to the federal government, *The New York Times* reported Tuesday.

The potential bonus for Chevron and its partners stems from a mistake the Interior Department made in signing offshore leases in the late 1990s for drilling in federal waters, the newspaper said.

Chevron and its partners, <u>Devon Energy</u> (<u>Charts</u>) and Statoil ASA of Norway, have six leases in the Jack oil field about 175 miles off Louisiana, and two of the leases allow the firms to avoid royalties on as much as 87.5 million barrels per lease, the *Times* said.

The benefit, known as royalty relief, was supposed to be halted if the price of oil climbed above \$36 a barrel, but that restriction was omitted on all leases signed in 1998 and 1999, including the two held by Chevron and its partners, the newspaper reported.

The exact value of the potential break will depend on the price of oil and how much of it comes from the two leases, and the savings would disappear if the government insists that none of Chevron's output is coming from the two leases, but from the four that are not eligible for the break, the newspaper said.

Chevron (Charts) shares fell Monday to close at \$62 on the New York Stock Exchange.



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#### No. 2 in Texas governor's race is still up in air

AUSTIN — The horse race polls have varied dramatically about who is running second in the Texas governor's race, but those surveys have made one thing perfectly clear: For most of the past year Texans have been unhappy with the job Rick Perry has done as governor. Perry's sagging job approval also is reflected in poll numbers showing support for his re-election has hovered between 35 percent and 41 percent since February.

However, that does not mean the Republican incumbent is in immediate danger of defeat. His four challengers are dividing the discontented voters, and none of them has gained traction so far.

"They're like dogs, running around chasing each other's tails, trying to eat the same piece of the pie," Perry pollster Mike Baselice said. "Perry, meanwhile, is sitting over there with a plurality, and he wins."

Perry's main challengers are after what they call the "anti-Perry vote." But the question remains whether Democrat Chris Bell or independents Kinky Friedman and Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn or Libertarian James Werner can consolidate this vote into a winning coalition.

"There is a bloc of voters out there right now waiting to see which one of the three is most likely to get Perry out," Friedman campaign manager Dean Barkley said. "That is the battle of September, to be the alternative to Perry."

Texas Governor: Perry (R) Dips to 35% Three Other Contenders Now Attract 18% Each August 9, 2006Three months from the election, the twisty four-way race for Texas Governor continues to keep political junkies on the edge of their seats.

Republican Governor Rick Perry's support has dropped by five percentage points since our <u>July poll</u>, as Democrat Chris Bell escapes last place to draw even with the two Independents in the race. So now it's Perry 35%, Bell 18%, Carole Keeton Strayhorn (I) 18%, Kinky Friedman (I) 18%.

Texas law makes those numbers look even better to Perry. There's no general-election runoff in Texas; if a candidate wins only a plurality on Election Day, he gets the job.

Last year, Perry escaped a possibly crippling challenge from U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson (R). Having dodged that bullet and watched his opponents divide the vote, he is now favored to win reelection. But, the incumbent has hardly locked it down.

Equal numbers of Texas voters have "very favorable" and "very unfavorable" views of Governor Perry. That's not a great position for an incumbent. However, it's better than the numbers posted by his competitors. Bell is viewed very favorably by 7% and very unfavorably by 12%, very low numbers for a major party challenger. For Strayhorn, the numbers are 14% very favorable and 18% very unfavorable. Friedman's numbers are 17% and 21% respectively.

Early in the year some observers wondered whether the two Independents might siphon enough votes from the Governor Perry to allow Democrat Bell to grab the prize. As things stand now, there's no certainty that Bell will be the one to benefit if Perry's position deteriorates further. Strayhorn is the only challenger currently competitive with Perry in terms of campaign cash.

The natural reluctance of voters to "waste" their votes on a third-party candidate obviously hasn't stopped the two Independents from making strong showings. Still, party loyalty may well have kept Strayhorn from attracting as much support as she would have as a Republican, or Bell from doing even more poorly.

Twenty-eight percent (28%) of likely voters here say the economy is the most important election issue to them. Eighteen percent (18%) say it's immigration, 16% say national security.

Thirty-eight percent (48%) agree that the political system is "badly broken"; 37% disagree.

**Texas Senate: Hutchison Cruising** 

Hutchison 61%, Radnofsky 31%

August 9, 2006 Republican Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison

Incumbent Republican Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison leads Democrat Barbara Ann Radnofsky 61% to 31% (see <u>crosstabs</u>). <u>Last month</u>, the incumbent enjoyed a 27-point advantage.

The most recent Rasmussen Reports survey of 500 Likely Voters conducted on August 3, 2006 shows Hutchison is viewed very favorably by 43% of the state's voters. Radnofsky, with a much lower level of name recognition, is viewed very favorably by only 8%.

Hutchison recently voted for a bill that would make it illegal to take a pregnant girl across state lines for an abortion without parental knowledge. Though Hutchison supports this bill, Texans are relatively divided on the issue of abortion—44% claim to be pro-choice, 48% pro-life. Proposals for restrictions on abortion, such as increased parental notification, typically attract far more support than the general pro-life position.

Like Georgia, Alabama and Virginia, the economy ranked as the national issue of greatest importance (see <u>crosstabs</u>). Immigration, a continuous controversial issue in Texas, ranked as the second most important issue in the Lone Star State at 18%. <u>Nationally</u>, gaining control of the borders continues to be the top priority of American voters.

#### **An Unexpected Collision Over Detainees**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14 — President Bush and Congressional Republicans spent the last 10 days laying the foundation for a titanic pre-election struggle over national security, and now they have one. But the fight playing out this week on Capitol Hill is not what they had in mind.

Instead of drawing contrasts with Democrats, the president's call for creating military tribunals to try terror suspects — a key substantive and political component of his fall agenda — has erupted into a remarkably intense clash pitting some of the best-known warriors in the Republican Party against Mr. Bush and the Congressional leadership.

At issue are definitions of what is permissible in trials and interrogations that both sides view as central to the character of the nation, the way the United States is perceived abroad and the rules of the game for what Mr. Bush has said will be a multigenerational battle against Islamic terrorists.

Democrats have so far remained on the sidelines, sidestepping Republican efforts to draw them into a fight over Mr. Bush's leadership on national security heading toward the midterm election. Democrats are rapt spectators, however, shielded by the **stern opposition to the president being expressed by three Republicans with impeccable credentials on military matters: Senators John McCain of Arizona, John W. Warner of Virginia and Lindsey Graham of South Carolina. The three were joined on Thursday by Colin L. Powell, formerly the secretary of state and the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, in challenging the administration's approach.** 

It is one of those rare Congressional moments when the policy is as monumental as the politics.

#### AN OVERPOPULATED EARTH?

Dr. Doom speaks his mind

Even threats don't quiet apocalyptic view of humanity's path

**Copyright 2006 Houston Chronicle Austin Bureau** AUSTIN - When classes resume at the University of Texas at Austin this week, 90 impressionable undergrads will file into an ecology class taught by a chatty zoology professor known — not always out of earshot — as Dr. Doom.

His real name is Eric Pianka, and students enrolled in his Ecology, Evolution and Society course will hear a sad synopsis of Earth's vanishing species and habitats — coupled with an apocalyptic warning about humans racing obliviously toward the edge of a high cliff.

If he models his lectures on previous ones, Pianka may remark that the planet would be better off without 90 percent of the humans who now populate it — no offense to anyone in particular.

"We should have done something about our population 25 or 30 years ago," the Denton A. Cooley Centennial Professor of Zoology said during a recent interview at his university office.

"Now we're going to have to go into a collapse. It's going to be very painful. The death rate is going to have to exceed the birth rate, we're going to have famines, civilizations are going to fall apart."

Such views have turned Pianka, a 67-year-old lizard expert, into one of UT's biggest public relations headaches.


#### Terror risk, death threats

It started last spring, when Pianka gave two academic audiences the same doomsday speech he's been delivering for years. Only this time, a reporter happened to be present and turned Pianka's remarks into a story in the Seguin Gazette-Enterprise. News services picked it up, the blog world went crazy, and pretty soon, Pianka was being reported to the FBI as a terror threat. The FBI saw no need to launch a formal investigation, but agents did meet with the professor to discuss the death threats that poured in.

Unflattering op-ed pieces and news stories appeared nationwide. The Boston Globe likened him to a "zealot in scientific garb."

Loved or hated, Pianka is a scientist with stellar credentials who uses his podium to advance ideas that can challenge, enlighten, frighten and offend—sometimes all at once.

#### THE "ONE PERCENT DOCTRINE"

RON SUSKIND: Right.

It's a -- it's a harrowing moment. It's in the Situation Room. There are folks from CIA and NSC there. And Tenet and others deliver the intelligence to the vice president. In Kandahar, a few weeks before 9/11, bin Laden and Zarqawi, the two key players, met with Pakistani nuclear scientists to talk about what's possible on that front.

It's -- of course, it's our worst shared nightmare. Cheney listens to the briefing. And, you know, he's -- he's quite alarmed by it. Everybody is in the government at this point. It's just two months after 9/11. We're worried about a second-wave attack. And -- and that's where the 1 percent moment, the 1 percent doctrine, emerges, right there in the room.





#### Here we go again! (Come on World take a deep breath!)

Benedict's remarks came on Tuesday, when he delivered a major address — which some church experts say was a defining speech of his pontificate — saying that the West, and specifically Europe, had become so beholden to reason that it had closed God out of public life, science and academia.

But the pope began this speech at Regensburg University with what he conceded were "brusque" words about Islam: He quoted a 14th Century Byzantine emperor as saying, "Show me just what Muhammad brought that was new, and there you will find things only evil and inhuman, such as his command to spread by the sword the faith he preached."

Benedict also used the word "jihad," or holy war, saying that violence was contrary to God's nature and to reason. But, at the end of a speech that did not otherwise mention Islam, he also said that reason could be the basis for "that genuine dialogue of cultures and religions so urgently needed today."

After his address on Tuesday, his spokesman said the pope did not intend to insult Islam. But many experts on Islam warned that Benedict ran the risk of offense in using such strong language, with tensions between religions so high.

And today, criticism began pouring the pope's way. The 79-year-old Benedict has taken a more skeptical, hard-nosed approach to Islam than did his predecessor, John Paul II, who died in April 2005.


"I don't think the church should point a finger at extremist activities in other religions, Aiman Mazyek, president of the Central Council of Muslims in Germany, told the newspaper Süddeutsche Zeitung, recalling the Crusades, the Spanish Inquisition and the Vatican's relations with Nazi Germany.



The famous Python Foot can here be seen in its original format in the bottom left corner of "An Allegory of Venus



### Global Warming – Man-Made?

This graph is based on ice cores drilled in Vostok, Antarctica. It shows temperature changes near the South Pole, which were more extreme than in the middle latitudes.



As recorded in ice cores from Vostok, Antarctica, the temperature near the South Pole has varied by more than 20 degrees Fahrenheit during the last 350,000 years. There have been peaks of warmth approximately every 100,000 years. The temperature and the carbon dioxide concentrations at the south pole parallel each other. The rise and fall of temperatures gives rise to the ice age/interglacial cycle.


