

Earlier this year the Supreme Court handed down a far-reaching decision allowing corporations and unions to spend unlimited advertising funds in candidate elections. Making matters worse, *Citizens United v. FEC* allows this

unlimited spending to be done in secret! (LVW)

Here are 5 reasons you should add your voice to this debate:

1. Secret money has no place in American democracy.

Corporations and unions should not be allowed to spend money in elections without full disclosure to the American public. The role of the voter -- not the corporation or organization -- in determining elections must be protected.

2. Corporations and unions should have to stand by their ads.

When huge sums are spent to urge voters to take a certain action through advertisements, it should be clear who footed the bill. The "stand by your ad" system in elections works for candidates -- we need it in place for corporate America too.

3. Federal bailout money should stay out of electioneering.

Companies that receive federal bailouts should not be able to spend money in elections. This is a clear conflict of interest that is even more damaging without full disclosure.

4. Coordinated spending should be open spending.

When a candidate, corporation or union get together to encourage voters to support or oppose a candidate, it should be clear who paid for any advertising or media.

5. Foreign corporations should never have a hand in American elections.

As it currently stands, *Citizens United* allows foreign corporations to spend unlimited amounts of money, secretly, on campaign advertising to influence the outcome of elections. A company controlled from outside the United States should not spend huge sums to support or oppose candidates.

Legislation to require disclosure of corporate and union electioneering, known as <u>the DISCLOSE Act</u>, has been introduced in the House and Senate, and the League of Women Voters is strongly supporting this bill. Our elected officials must protect the rights of voters. Congress must pass a fair and balanced bill before the 2010 elections to ensure these rights.

WASHINGTON – The government on Friday accused Wall Street's most powerful firm of fraud, saying Goldman Sachs & Co. sold mortgage investments without telling the buyers that the securities were crafted with input from a client who was betting on them to fail.

And fail they did. The securities cost investors close to \$1 billion while helping Goldman client Paulson & Co. capitalize on the housing bust. The Goldman executive accused of shepherding the deal allegedly boasted about the "exotic trades" he created "without necessarily understanding all of the implications of those monstrosities!!!"

The civil charges filed by the Securities and Exchange Commission are the government's most significant legal action related to the mortgage meltdown that ignited the financial crisis and helped plunge the country into recession.

The news sent Goldman Sachs shares and the stock market reeling as the SEC said other financial deals related to the meltdown continue to be investigated. It was a blow to the reputation of a financial giant that had emerged relatively unscathed from the economic crisis.

Goldman Sachs denied the allegations. In a statement, it called the SEC's charges "completely unfounded in law and fact" and said it will contest them.

Ash from an erupting volcano blanketed the ground in Iceland on Friday and left a widening trail of grounded aircraft across Europe, as thousands of planes stayed on the tarmac to avoid the hazardous cloud.

British aviation authorities extended a ban on flights over England and Wales for six more hours into Saturday morning but say restrictions over Scotland and Northern Ireland are being lifted.

The National Air Traffic Service said in a statement that the British flight ban now stretches to 7 a.m. local time, 2 a.m. ET. The ban affects all of London's five airports, including Heathrow, Europe's busiest.


A suspension of new offshore drilling permits prompted by the Deepwater Horizon disaster soon will cost thousands of jobs and idle more than half of the rigs in the Gulf of Mexico, an industry group seeking at least a partial lifting of the ban said Thursday.

The indefinite ban on new offshore drilling that Interior Secretary Ken Salazar announced in Houston last week could cost 7,500 to 10,000 rig Jobs by the end of June and force smaller companies to default on Ioans and miss payroll, the International Association of Drilling Contractors said.

A new Rasmussen Reports telephone survey finds that 70% of likely voters in Arizona approve of the legislation SB1070, while just 23% oppose it.

Opponents of the measure, including major national Hispanic groups, say it will lead to racial profiling, and 53% of voters in the state are concerned that efforts to identify and deport illegal immigrants also will end up violating the civil rights of some U.S. citizens. 

Why Did the Senate Vote to Audit the Fed?

More By Max Fisher on May 12, 2010 3:42pm On Monday, the Senate voted 96-0 to add to the financial reform bill an amendment requiring the Federal Reserve to undergo a one-time audit. Authored by Vermont Independent Bernie Sanders, the amendment accomplishes a long-time goal of the libertarian, Tea Party wing of the Republican Party, best represented by Texas Rep. Ron Paul, who has <u>frequently called</u> to audit the Fed. How did the audit-the-Fed movement not only go mainstream, but lead the Senate into one its rare unanimous votes?

What the Audit Does The Washington Post's <u>Brady Dennis explains</u>, "the Fed must undergo a one-time examination of its massive emergency lending programs and post details on its Web site by December about the firms that benefited from its lending during the crisis. The new language, however, prevents investigators from peering into the central bank's deliberations on interest rates and other elements of monetary policy." 

Phil Jones makes some unexpected admissions

The former director of the Climate Research Unit (CRU) at Britain's University of East Anglia, admitted to the BBC last Saturday that there has been no statistically significant global warming since 1995, and that the world may have been warmer during medieval times.

In the interview (<u>http://bit.ly/bv1fec</u>), professor Phil Jones, a former lead author on the International Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) 2001 assessment report and outspoken proponent of the man-made-global-warming theory, confessed to the following:

There was no statistically significant global warming from 1995 to 2009. (Although temperatures edged up at a rate of 0.12 Celsius per decade during that period, it was not significant, according to Jones.)

From January 2002 to the present, the earth has been cooling. (Jones said the temperature decline is "not statistically significant," while failing to mention that the falling temperatures contradict the IPPC model, which forecast a temperature increase of 0.2 degrees Celsius per decade.


The Medieval Warm Period (MWP) from 800 to 1300 A.D., did exist, a scientifically accepted fact that Jones and other climate researchers tried to discount or hide. According to Jones: If the Medieval Warm Period "was shown to be global in extent and as warm as or warmer than today . . . then obviously the late-20th century warmth would not be unprecedented" (Jones, however, clings to the belief that the MWP may not have been global and may have affected only parts of the North America, the North Atlantic, Europe and parts of Asia.)

The warming rates for the periods 1860 to 1880, 1910 to 1940 and 1975 to 1998 "are not statistically significantly different." In other words, none of these warm periods -- early and recent -- is exceptional or unusual. (Even if the recent warming had been "statistically significantly different," it would not implicate CO2 emissions as the cause.)

Jones' Johnny-come-lately confession may shock fellow researchers still clinging desperately to the fast-disintegrating global warming theory, but skeptics who have been making the same declarations for years, and were ignored, are enjoying a "We told you" moment.


"They've finally admitted that the current warming period is similar to previous warming periods. Congratulations, we've known that for a long time," says <u>Michael Smith</u>, a software engineer who played a key role in exposing the manipulation of global temperature data by NASA and NOAA.


Sunspot Projections

ISES Solar Cycle Sunspot Number Progression Observed data through Apr 2010




Various Projections (07)

Quiet sun puts Europe on ice 14 April 2010 by <u>Stuart Clark</u>

BRACE yourself for more winters like the last one, northern Europe. Freezing conditions could become more likely: winter temperatures may even plummet to depths last seen at the end of the 17th century, a time known as the Little Ice Age. That's the message from a new study that identifies a compelling link between solar activity and winter temperatures in northern Europe.

The research finds that low solar activity promotes the formation of giant kinks in the jet stream. These kinks can block warm westerly winds from reaching Europe, while allowing in winds from Arctic Siberia. When this happens in winter, northern Europe freezes, even though other, comparable regions of the globe may be experiencing unusually mild conditions.

When to Doubt a Consensus

(1) When different claims get bundled together. Usually, in scientific disputes, there is more than one claim at issue. With global warming, there's the claim that our planet, on average, is getting warmer. There's also the claim that human emissions are the main cause of it, that it's going to be catastrophic, and that we have to transform civilization to deal with it. These are all different assertions with different bases of evidence. Evidence for warming, for instance, isn't evidence for the cause of that warming. All the polar bears could drown, the glaciers melt, the sea levels rise 20 feet, Newfoundland become a popular place to tan, and that wouldn't tell us a thing about what caused the warming. This is a matter of logic, not scientific evidence. The effect is not the same as the cause.


There's a lot more agreement about (1) a modest warming trend since about 1850 than there is about (2) the cause of that trend. There's even less agreement about (3) the dangers of that trend, or of (4) what to do about it. But these four propositions are frequently bundled together, so that if you doubt one, you're labeled a climate change "skeptic" or "denier." That's just plain intellectually dishonest. When well-established claims are fused with separate, more controversial claims, and the entire conglomeration is covered with the label "consensus," **you have reason for doubt**.

Pre-historic Climate Change



This graph is based on ice cores drilled in Vostok, Antarctica. It shows temperature changes near the South Pole, which were more extreme than in the middle latitudes.



As recorded in ice cores from Vostok, Antarctica, the temperature near the South Pole has varied by more than 20 degrees Fahrenheit during the last 350,000 years. There have been peaks of warmth approximately every 100,000 years. The temperature and the carbon dioxide concentrations at the south pole parallel each other. The rise and fall of temperatures gives rise to the ice age/interglacial cycle.







Our Middle Aged Brains David Niesel and Norbert Herzog

Ah... if only I could stay young... instead of faking it.

No kidding! It's actually true that our brains change with age. There was a report that said forty percent of your brain cells are lost with age but that's actually not true....

Something the middle aged brain is better at doing is recognizing the central idea or big picture. So if the brain is in good shape, it can build pathways that allow it to recognize patterns and their significance and find a solution faster than a young person.

How do you keep effective brain connections and establish more of them?

Even at middle age, the human brain has plasticity... meaning it can change and increase the complexity of the connections. **One theory about promoting adult brain health is to confront your brain with thoughts that are contrary to your own.**

For example when taking a history class, read multiple viewpoints and reflect on how that influences your opinion. If you only read about and talk with those who agree with your views, your brain won't be challenged to create new connections.

So force your brain to stretch!

Learn a foreign language or take a different route to work. Just because you're middle-aged like we are does not mean your brain can't stay sharp.

Hope Can Turn Toxic

"... hope is actually- toxic. If you hold it long enough without some resolution."

We Marginalize Nature

"...we have created a world in which we marginalize that which we don't think serves us as well as it could. We've turned nature into a thing. You know, Martin Buber's wonderful I/it relationship and I/thou relationship. This is an "it." The book is an "it." It is soulless. It is utilitarian. I can throw it on the ground if I want. But if it's an <u>I/thou</u> relationship, you never make those kinds of presumptions. So a lot of what traditional people when you watch- when vou're in their environment, everything is <u>I/thou</u>. The relationship to the wind; the wind is alive. It has a soul. It's part of the moral universe."

A Love of Humanity

"...you know, you can turn on the television and see people who claim expertise that they don't possess. And I say that, because the kind of expertise we need is not a facile grasp of policy, but a love of humanity. That's what we need.

The Darkness and the Light

"Why does the Dalai Lama laugh? Why does Desmond Tutu--you know, was somebody that I worked with once--why is he capable of such laughter?" And I think part of the answer is that they're fully comfortable with the riotous expression, the darkness and the light, of what it means to be alive."

Opening Yourself Up to The Earth

"And then you've got to be on your own, walking the earth, opening yourself up to it, becoming vulnerable. And it's talking to you. And you take it in. And then you sit down with somebody whose-background is completely different from yours. And you say, "When you look out there, what do you see?" And then just listen. "

The Spiritual Interior of the Language

"And Kazumasa San said to me, "Your work is to take care of the spiritual interior of the language." And he said in Japanese this word we use, kotodama, means that each word has within it a spiritual interior. The word is like a vessel that carries something ineffable. And you must be the caretaker for that. You must be careful when you use language to look at every part of the word and make sure that you're showing respect for it in the place that you've given it to live in the sentence."

Mostly You Know it all, But You Forget It.

"I think, what is at the core of every story. I mean, how many novels have you put down and said to yourself, "Oh, I never knew that." Mostly you know it all, but you forget it. And you close a book and you say, "I knew that, but I'd forgotten it. And I am so glad to be reminded of what I intend to do and who I am. And what-- and how I want to conduct myself in the world."

And he was saying, "You know, Moyers, for the first time in my life," and he's in his 50s, he said, "I'm beginning to think this America I believed in won't work. a failure to believe and a witness to what is incomprehensible

"When I sit at that typewriter, I have to be frightened of what I'm trying to do. I'm frightened by my own, belief that I can actually get a story down on paper. I still have that thing in my mind from childhood, "Who cares what you have to say?" So, my path is the same path. It's still a path through confusion and lack of self confidence, and struggle and embarrassment over all of my imperfection. But I would tell you at the same time, I have seen things that have dropped me to my knees in a state of awe, and when I know that that too is there, if I can find a way to build with language a bridge between a failure to believe and a witness to what is incomprehensible. If I can build that bridge and then do it again and then do it again. I would hope that at the end of my life, somebody would say, "Well, his life was useful. He helped."

"Okay, you stole fire. Great for you.

"But for people all over the world, in small groups, to be in touch with each other about what is welling up in every country, among every group of people, which is a desire for justice. You know, there-- I'm trying to remember the story. I don't remember the philosopher, the Greek philosopher who told the story of Zeus and **Prometheus.** Which really stuck when I first heard it, is that Zeus said to Prometheus, "Okay, you stole fire. Great for you. Now your people have technology. Wonderful. But here's something you don't know."

But here's something you don't know...

You lack two things. And if you don't take these two things that I will give you, this will be a failure. Technology, you know, fire, all your magic, it will fail completely. It will be your undoing. And the two things that you need to make it work are justice and reverence.

Five times between June 2007 and June 2008, the writer Sebastian Junger traveled to a remote **Army outpost in the Korengal Valley in** Afghanistan. Junger, a contributing editor for Vanity Fair, made the trip to embed with a company of soldiers from the Army's 173rd Airborne Brigade as they fought to keep the **Taliban from controlling a small, treacherous plot** of land. After he returned, Junger wrote about the experiences of these soldiers in a book that he says attempts to locate exactly what it is about combat that appeals to young men.

Defining peace

The concept of peace is notoriously difficult to define. The simplest way of approaching it is in terms of harmony achieved by the absence of war or conflict. Applied to nations, this would suggest that those not involved in violent conflicts with neighbouring states or suffering internal wars would have achieved a state of peace. This is what Johan Galtung defined as a "negative peace" - an absence of violence.

Positive Peace

The concept of negative peace is immediately intuitive and empirically measurable, and can be used as a starting point to elaborate its counterpart concept, "positive peace": having established what constitutes an absence of violence, is it possible to identify which structures and institutions create and maintain peace

Opposite Of Radical: Today's Youth Trust Uncle Sam

A generation ago, young people vowed never to trust anyone over 30. But as it turns out, those under 30 today are actually more trusting of the government of all age groups, according to a survey by the Pew Research Center.

"As of now, I trust the government," says Brittany Tucker, a poli-sci major at Northeastern University in Boston. "I feel like they are trying to do what's best for us and their constituents."

Everything is Relative

Tucker believes the government helps more than it hurts. The percentage of young people who agree with her is significantly higher than is the percentage of older people who agree, though it's worth noting that it's still only about a third of the younger set who say they trust the government all or most of the time — and it's often with caveats.

As another poli-sci major, Jennifer Kral, puts it, everything is relative


Percentage of respondents who were not aware of the Tea Party, by age group:

Basic Wilderness Survival Skills From: British Columbia Outdoor Wilderness Guide

Fear - For anyone faced with a wilderness emergency survival situation, fear is a normal reaction. Unless an emergency situation has been anticipated, fear is generally followed by panic then pain, cold, thirst, hunger, fatigue, boredom and loneliness. It is extremely important to calmly assess the situation and not allow these seven enemies to interfere with your survival.

Pain - Pain may often be ignored in a panic situation. Remember to deal with injuries immediately before they become even more serious.

Cold - Cold lowers the ability to think, numbing the body and reducing the will to survive. Never allow yourself to stop moving or to fall asleep unless adequately sheltered. **Thirst** - Dehydration is a common enemy in an emergency situation and must not be ignored. It can dull your mind, causing you to overlook important survival information.

Hunger - Hunger is dangerous but seldom deadly. It may reduce your ability to think logically and increase your susceptibility to the effects of cold, pain and fear.

Fatigue - Fatigue is unavoidable in any situation so it is best to keep in mind that it can and will lower your mental ability. Remember that in an emergency situation this is often the bodies way of escaping a difficult situation.

Boredom & Loneliness - These enemies are quite often unanticipated and may lower mind's ability to deal with the situation.



When Monty Python had no ending for a skit, this foot would appear out of the sky and squash whatever was on screen with a rude noise. Allowing the show to move on.




Today's stock market bears about as much resemblance to the real economy as a game of poker or Monopoly or Trivial Pursuit.





Born a poor Siberian peasant, Rasputin became Alexandra's closest advisor due to his ability to alieve her son's sufferings. A powerful and a alcoholic, Rasputin attended orgies and church services with equal devotion. The police and family friends warned the royal couple about Rasputin. The Tsar did nothing. Alexandra dismissed the tales and their tellers as lies and liars. Because Alexis' illness was secret, St. Petersburg assumed Rasputin was or might be her lover. Of course whoever thought this must have been crazy, cause with a hideous monk like him, and a beautiful tsarista like Alexandra it MUST be a rumor!! The rumor was false (of course!). Rasputin influenced the Tsar's political decisions, and his meddling and advice crippled the Imperial government.
