

Let every nation know, whether it wishes us well or ill, that we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe, to assure the survival and the success of liberty.

My fellow citizens of the world, ask not what America will do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of man.

Finally, whether you are citizens of America or citizens of the world, ask of us here the same high standards of strength and sacrifice which we ask of you. With a good conscience our only sure reward, with history the final judge of our deeds, let us go forth to lead the land we love, asking His blessing and His help, but knowing that here on earth God's work must truly be our own.

Eisenhower's Farewell Address to the Nation January 17, 1961

Until the latest of our world conflicts, the United States had no armaments industry. American makers of plowshares could, with time and as required, make swords as well. But now we can no longer risk emergency improvisation of national defense; we have been compelled to create a permanent armaments industry of vast proportions. Added to this, three and a half million men and women are directly engaged in the defense establishment. We annually spend on military security more than the net income of all United States corporations.

American makers of plowshares could, with time and as required, make swords as well. But now we can no longer risk emergency improvisation of national defense; we have been compelled to create a permanent armaments industry of vast proportions.

This conjunction of an immense military establishment and a large arms industry is new in the American experience. The total influence – economic, political, even spiritual – is felt in every city, every Statehouse, every office of the Federal government. We recognize the imperative need for this development. Yet we must not fail to comprehend its grave implications. Our toil, resources and livelihood are all involved; so is the very structure of our society.

Eisenhower's Farewell Address to the Nation January 17, 1961 (continued)

In the councils of government, we must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unsought, by the military-industrial complex. The potential for the disastrous rise of misplaced power exists and will persist.

We must never let the weight of this combination endanger our liberties or democratic processes. We should take nothing for granted. Only an alert and knowledgeable citizenry can compel the proper meshing of the huge industrial and military machinery of defense with our peaceful methods and goals, so that security and liberty may prosper together.

One Chinese saying about the country's ties with the U.S. goes like this: the U.S. and China are too dependent on one another for their relationship to be terribly bad, but they are too different from one another for their relationship to ever be very good. Since the relative high of President Barack Obama's visit to China in November 2009, the nations' dynamic has emphasized the second part of that saying. But with Chinese President Hu Jintao arriving in the U.S. this week, the two powers have labored to achieve a measure of accord on some critical issues including North Korea, military relations, climate change and trade. The question now is whether that easing of tensions will mean real progress during Hu's Jan. 18-21 visit and, more important, whether the improved relations can continue.

NEW YORK (CBS) With Thursday's arrest of 125 reputed east coast mobsters, in what officials tell CBS News is "the largest one-day mob roundup in U.S. history," comes a slew of colorful mafioso nicknames. "Baby Shacks," "The Old Man" and "The Professor"...to name a few.

Of course, not every mobster has a nickname; some have multiple monikers.

Nicknames can come from family, business associates, the press or the police. Al "Scarface" Capone got his when he was slashed in the face after insulting a woman at a Brooklyn nightclub. Newspapers started calling Benjamin Siegel "Bugsy" which came from "bugs," slang for crazy.

Luigi Manocchio, aka "Baby Shacks": Mafia Nicknames Front and Center in Roundup - 2

Below is a sampling of some reputed La Cosa Nostra mobsters who were arrested on Jan. 20, their alleged roles, and their nicknames:

Luigi Manocchio aka "Baby Shacks" - member, underboss and boss who reportedly received monthly cash protection payments from strip club owners in Providence, R.I., and the reputed leader of New England's Patriarca crime family.

Joseph Corozzo aka "JoJo" - at various times a soldier, a captain and a consigliore in the organized crime family.

Michael Roccaforte aka "Roc" - part of Alphonse Trucchio's (participant in Gambino organized crime family) crew.

Vincenzo Frogiero aka "Vinny Carwash" - a soldier in the Gambino crime family.

Frank Bellantoni aka "Meatball" - member of Trucchio's crew.

Christopher Reynolds aka "Burger" - member of Trucchio's crew.

Luigi Manocchio, aka "Baby Shacks": Mafia Nicknames Front and Center in Roundup - 3

Michael Russo aka "Mush" - member of Trucchio's crew.

Anthino Russo aka "Hootie" - member of Trucchio's crew.

John Brancaccio aka "Johnny Bandana" a member of Trucchio's crew.

Vito Cortesiano aka "Vito Love" - associate in the Gambino crime family.

Bartolomeo Vernace aka "Pepe," "Bobby," "Bobby Glasses" and "Robert" - associate, soldier and captain in the Gambino crime family as well as part of the ruling panel formed to oversee the family.

Tyner balked,"If you touch my junk," he told the agent, "I'll have you arrested."


The TSA agent contacted his supervisor who further explained that if he didn't want the pat down he could be escorted out of the airport and would not fly that day.

Tyner told the agent, "I don't understand how a sexual assault can be made a condition of my flying."


The supervisor rebutted that the pat down was not a sexual assault. He was also heard saying, "By buying your ticket you gave up a lot of rights."

- •Chinese consumers don't gorge on debt. China's financial system isn't yet geared to consumers, and credit is a lot harder to get than it is in the West. Yet even as it becomes available to higher-income consumers, they're not biting. "Consumers elsewhere tend to trade up as they get wealthier," according to the McKinsey report. "Some start relying on credit, often spending more than they can afford. Not in China. Consumers there remain very concerned about financial stability and spend within their means." It will be interesting to see if Chinese consumers retain that discipline as their nation gets wealthier. They seem to be off to a good start.
- •If they "trade up" to more expensive goods, they also "trade down" on other things to help pay for the indulgence.
- •They budget first and buy second (or don't buy at all).
- •They spend months researching purchases.

Thailand extradites alleged arms dealer Bout to US

BANGKOK (AP) — Thailand extradited accused Russian arms trafficker Viktor Bout to the U.S. on Tuesday to face terrorism charges, siding with Washington in a tug of war with Moscow over whether to send him to stand trial or let him go home.

The Cabinet approved Bout's extradition Tuesday after a long legal battle, and police said the 43–year–old was put aboard a plane that departed Bangkok at about 1:30 p.m. (0630 GMT; 1:30 a.m. EST) in the custody of eight U.S. officials.

They threw the bums out Tuesday. From D.C. to Houston's City Hall, the voters' verdict will resonate through changes that affect all of us. Here's how the 2010 midterm election is likely to change your lives, from the red-light cameras you hate to the income tax you pay.

- 1. Immigration: Bipartisan immigration reform as we know it is dead.
- **2. Renew Houston:** If you own property in Houston, you'll have to fork over a monthly drainage fee ranging from \$5 to \$15.

Effect of 2010 midterms

- **3. Redistricting:** Following the Democratic bloodbath on Tuesday, Texas Republicans will wield almost complete control over the 2011 Texas Legislature, which will redraw congressional and legislative district lines to reflect population changes from the 2010 census. Texas, the nation's fastest-growing state, is likely to gain four House seats. Tuesday's election means that you are more likely to be represented by a Republican or a Latino House member in 2012, because the GOP is likely to divide the spoils of redistricting between Republicans and the burgeoning Hispanic population.
- **4. Health care:** Immovable force, meet the immovable object.
- **5. Budget woes and tax cuts:** The story is the same in Austin and Washington: budgets doused in red ink. Texas is facing a budget shortfall of \$18 billion to \$21 billion next year, but Republicans are promising no new taxes. Republican gains mean that deep cuts are likely in human services and education programs.

Effect of 2010 midterms

- **6. Energy:** The Republican House takeover shuts the door on Democratic proposals to impose a carbon tax. The 49 other states have agreed to allow the EPA to set limits, but Texas has refused to do so.
- 7. Voter ID: Republicans have failed in two legislative sessions to force through a bill requiring Texans to produce valid photo identification before voting. The new GOP super-majority in the Texas House increases the likelihood that the third time will be the charm.
- **8. Red lights:** Say goodbye to those hated red-light cameras.
- **9. Perry power:** Gov. Rick Perry, referred to in Austin circles as "Governor 39 Percent" after his underwhelming 2006 victory, silenced the doubters Tuesday. A book tour that includes appearances on *Fox & Friends*, the Glenn Beck radio program, NBC's *Today Show* and Jon Stewart's *The Daily Show* on Comedy Central. Perry promises to restrain government spending in Texas without raising taxes.

Effect of 2010 midterms

10. 2012: Now that the 2010 election season is over, aren't you psyched for the 2012 presidential election?

No? Well, the White House wannabes are.

Already, a passel of Republican presidential possibilities have been paying homage to voters in Iowa, site of the first-in-the-nation caucuses, New Hampshire, home to the first presidential primary, and South Carolina, the first Southern showdown state. Among those testing the waters: 2008 presidential also-rans Mitt Romney and Mike Huckabee, Minnesota Gov. Tim Pawlenty, former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour, South Dakota Sen. John Thune, Indiana Rep. Mike Pence, former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum and, of course, former vice presidential nominee Sarah Palin. Perry has denied any interest in seeking the GOP nomination, but he wouldn't mind being a kingmaker in 2012.

... Their creation does not require the intervention of some


supernatural being or god. Rather, these multiple universes arise naturally from physical law. They are a prediction of science.




