
A Brighter Future

From the video ...

At the heart of Al Qaida there is rage. There is a longing for revenge. There is a desire to humiliate the West and reverse the cycle of history. But, there is no plan for success. There is only destruction. Perhaps al Qaida can best be understood as an engine that runs on the despair of the Muslim World, especially its their young men whose lives are so futile and unexpressed. We think of al Qaida as a terror organization, but from their point of view it is really a suicide machine. "We love death", the call that summoned the Arabs to Afghanistan in the first place.

Video continued

Al Qaida offers them a chance to make history all they have to do is die and they did die in and die they they did in Tunisia, Bali, Mombasa, Read, Casablanca, Jakarta, Istanbul, Madrid, London, Amman, Algiers, Ankara, Glasgow, Karachi, Islamabad, and Sanaa. Most of these attacks were in Muslim countries. Indeed, the number of Muslims who have died at the hands of Al Qaida in Iraq alone far exceeds the number of Americans who died on 9-11.

I also picked up a copy of Karen Armstrong's, *Islam, A Short History*, and learned that Muhammad's message was simple and ethical: (From Chapter 1, "Beginnings", p4)

He taught the Arabs no new doctrines about God: most of the Quraysh were already convinced that Allah had created the world and would judge humanity in the Last Days, as Jews and Christians believed. Muhammad did not think that he was founding a new religion, but that he was merely bringing the old faith in the One God to the Arabs, who had never had a prophet before. It was wrong, he insisted, to build a private fortune, but good to share wealth and create a society where the weak and vulnerable were treated with respect. If the Quraysh did not mend their ways, their society would collapse (as had other unjust societies in the past) because they were violating the fundamental laws of existence.

Recitations

This was the core teaching of the new scripture, called the quran (recitation), because believers, most of whom, including Muhammad himself, were illiterate, imbibed its teachings by listening to public readings of its chapters (surahs). The Quran was revealed to Muhammad, verse by verse, surah by surah during the next twenty-one years, often in response to a crisis or a question that had arisen in the little community of the faithful.

• • •

Some were concerned about the fundamental injustice of their society. All pre-modern civilizations were based economically upon a surplus of agricultural produce; they therefore depended upon the labour of peasants who could not enjoy their high culture, which was only for an elite.

Market Economy and Monotheism

To counter this, the new faiths stressed the importance of compassion. Arabia had remained outside the civilized world. Its intractable climate meant that the Arabs lived on the brink of starvation; there seemed no way that they could acquire an agrarian surplus that would put them on a footing with Sassanid Persia or Byzantium. But when the Quraysh began to develop a market economy their perspective began to change. Many were still happy with the old paganism, but there was a growing tendency to worship only one God; and there was, as we have seen, a creeping unease about the inequity of the new civilization that was developing in Mecca. The Arabs were now ready for an Axial Age faith of their own.

Our interest in Afghanistan is not as recent as many think, and it wasn't just *Charlie Wilson's War* either.

In an interview, Zbigniew Brzezinski, President Carter's National Security Adviser, admits that it was US policy to support radical Islamists to undermine Russia. He admits that US covert action drew Russia into starting the Afghan war in 1979. Asked if he has regrets about this, he responds,

Regret What?

"Regret what? That secret operation was an excellent idea. It had the effect of drawing the Russians into the Afghan trap and you want me to regret it? The day that the Soviets officially crossed the border, I wrote to President Carter: We now have the opportunity of giving to the USSR its Vietnam war." Then he is asked if he regrets "having given arms and advice to future terrorists," and he responds, "What is most important to the history of the world? The Taliban or the collapse of the Soviet empire? Some stirred-up Muslims or the liberation of Central Europe and the end of the Cold War?"

Nonsense!

The interviewer then says, "Islamic fundamentalism represents a world menace today." But Brzezinski responds, "Nonsense! It is said that the West had a global policy in regard to Islam. That is stupid. There isn't a global Islam...." [Le Nouvel Observateur (Paris), 1/15/1998]

What do you think of that! Jimmy Carter actually baited the Soviet Union into invading Afghanistan which did, as *Brzezinski predicted become it's Vietnam*. Even though Ronald Reagan got the credit for bringing down the wall with a little help from "Star Wars," the anti missile defense system that never worked.

Students protest Teachers, Teachers complain pupils run wild





What makes you an Authority?

The word authority comes from the word *author*. And the word author has a Latin root. It means: "he who enables growth".

So, the person whom you recognize as an authority is a person who enables your growth.

The others are the ones to decide if I am an authority to them or not.

What makes you an Authority?

Your personal abilities:

- 1. Your Inner Power
- 2. Your knowledge

Authority and Inner Power:

I just said the true Authority is the result of your Inner Power.
This means I would judge your sense of Authority at your Inner Power.

Authority and Inner Power:

Yet, most people will judge your authority by **how you appear** and **how you act**.

We could call this your intrapersonal intelligence and your interpersonal intelligence.

People will confuse your Inner Power with your appearance and your acts, which are part of the ego.

This means that may you be totally genuine or totally faked, you will be an authority for someone.

Some will like a person's big ego and strong personality.

And he will be considered as an authority to them. That's their choice.

Some others will prefer another person's genuine vibration and ability to connect and recognize the source, and he will be considered as an authority to them.

It's always the others' choice.

Authority and Knowledge:

You can be considered an authority for thousands of characteristics: It can be because you are a good listener, or because you react calmly and softly to others' fragilities, or because you are good at saying No, or because you have no fears, or because you verbalize and observe your emotions... If you are an individual who is very much identified with your ego, you will recognize authority to egotistic people.

If you are an individual who prefers to connect to the Source, to the I Am, you will recognize authority in spiritual people, for example, but not in egotistic people.

Authority and Knowledge:

Your knowledge is your ability to master <u>Instruction on Matter</u>.

People will like your knowledge in Economy, or in Finance, or in Law, or in Philosophy, or in Engineering, or in Astrology, or in Painting...

This means authority does not claim for obedience, never!

Only someone who feels that his authority may be at stake will claim for obedience thru the use of power.

Not so fast, I'm afraid. We still have work to do if we are going to still have the America we thought we were going to have, but we see disappearing.





Basic Wilderness Survival SkillsFrom: **British Columbia Outdoor Wilderness Guide**

Fear - For anyone faced with a wilderness emergency survival situation, fear is a normal reaction. Unless an emergency situation has been anticipated, fear is generally followed by panic then pain, cold, thirst, hunger, fatigue, boredom and loneliness. It is extremely important to calmly assess the situation and not allow these seven enemies to interfere with your survival.

Pain - Pain may often be ignored in a panic situation. Remember to deal with injuries immediately before they become even more serious.

Cold - Cold lowers the ability to think, numbing the body and reducing the will to survive. Never allow yourself to stop moving or to fall asleep unless adequately sheltered.

Thirst - Dehydration is a common enemy in an emergency situation and must not be ignored. It can dull your mind, causing you to overlook important survival information.

Hunger - Hunger is dangerous but seldom deadly. It may reduce your ability to think logically and increase your susceptibility to the effects of cold, pain and fear.

Fatigue - Fatigue is unavoidable in any situation so it is best to keep in mind that it can and will lower your mental ability. Remember that in an emergency situation this is often the bodies way of escaping a difficult situation.

Boredom & Loneliness - These enemies are quite often unanticipated and may lower mind's ability to deal with the situation.
